Choosing a mural design

Forest Hill Society September 2024



Background



The Forest Hill Society raised funds from the London Borough of Lewisham NCIL funding programme in 2022.

The intention was to upgrade the community areas of the Forest Hill Station car park by improving the bike parking.

As the rack could not be moved, it was cleaned instead and made more attractive, and we will also be adding a bike repair stand.

However, the area itself remained rather drab and unattractive so we also decided to commission a mural to enhance the wall above the rack and car park, and make the area more of a destination and welcoming space.

We put together a process for getting ideas and selecting a final mural design with community input. We also selected Artmongers and the London School of Muralism, both based in Lewisham, to design and paint the mural.





The Process

Process - voting

To make the final selection, we decided to do three things:

- Create an online form so users could view the options, select their favourite and even leave a comment
- Put up a physical voting form at the Library, and also take this to the Station, so passers-by could vote
- 3. Create a final panel to include non Forest Hill Society individuals, with their own stake in Forest Hill, to help us interpret all the feedback and select a winner









The Final Designs



Option 1: The Urban Nest



The nest is sitting comfortably on top of the bike rack reminding us how all animals adapt to their environment to survive and to thrive. It is made of a combination of soft and hard materials such a twigs, wool and felt. The colors and light make it look like it is glowing. The word sanctuary invite us to recognise how our home is our sanctuary as well as celebrating Lewisham being the first borough of Sanctuary.




Option 2: The Way Back Home



This image refers to the 'crown shyness' natural effect in some forests, where trees leave a gap between each other allowing light to filter through to the ground and so help other species of plants and animals to thrive on the ground. This image might inspire us to also build a more nurturing environment where everyone can thrive. The banner reminds us how trees and nature are part of our daily lives in Forest Hill, bringing tranquility and stability.

Option 3: A bug's eye's view



A reinterpretation of the space outside Forest Hill Station, seen from the point of view of a bug hanging out on the planters. To the left, the station entrance and to the right the High Street. This option acknowledges the residents of the natural world as well as humans. The trees canopy create shelter from the sun on a summer's day. The change of perspective challenges our expectations of a familiar scene to discover something new.

Results - online vote

Having shared the form via email to members and supporters, but also having members share it locally and putting the link on Twitter/X, Instagram and Facebook, we collected a staggering number of responses

Summary of comments on Option 1 from the online form *

The overall sentiment across the comments is overwhelmingly positive, with many people appreciating the visual appeal, concept, and deeper meaning behind the mural. Several comments emphasize the use of vibrant, warm colours and how they enhance the aesthetic experience, making the mural feel welcoming, comforting, and uplifting. Many people connect emotionally to the idea of the "nest" as a symbol of home and sanctuary, especially in the context of Lewisham being a borough of sanctuary. This concept resonates with both the natural world and human experiences, drawing a connection between the local environment, wildlife, and the diverse communities that have made their homes in the area.

The mural is praised not just for its beauty but also for its thoughtful interaction with the space, particularly how it integrates with the bike shed and brickwork. The idea of creating a sanctuary is celebrated, with some commenters highlighting how the mural speaks to broader themes of refuge, safety, and belonging, especially for migrants, refugees, and the homeless. While there are a few more neutral or critical voices, describing it as "cold" or "better than nothing," the majority of the feedback reflects admiration for the mural's concept, vibrancy, and its ability to evoke a strong emotional connection with viewers.

Summary of comments on Option41 from the online form *

The sentiment around the mural proposals is largely negative, with many expressing dissatisfaction with the designs and their suitability for the space. A significant number of people feel that none of the options do justice to the area or enhance its aesthetic appeal. Critics describe the designs as "garish," "unattractive," and even "crass," arguing that they lack relevance to Forest Hill's unique character. Many would prefer to leave the brick wall as is, praising its timeless beauty and simplicity over what they see as busy, overly literal, or generic artwork. There is also concern that murals tend to deteriorate over time or become targets for graffiti, further detracting from the space.


Several commenters believe the funds could be better spent on more practical improvements, such as cleaning, security, or greening the station area. Others suggest that the designs fail to reflect the vibrant local artistic community and feel that more thought should have been given to commissioning local artists or creating art that better represents Forest Hill's history and culture. While some appreciate the idea of a mural in theory, they feel the current options fall short of what the community deserves, calling for a recommissioning process that involves more local input or a fresh, more refined approach to street art that feels relevant and impactful.

The Final Decision

Decision - Friday, 27th Sept 2024

We put together a local panel with a diverse range of individuals, not all connected to the Society, to help us to select one option for the artist to paint.

While we have gathered a LOT of community feedback, this was just one part of the process designed to provide a preference that we would consider in this final stage. This was not necessarily a decision to be taken solely by popular vote, particularly since we did not know how close the vote might end up being.

We were able to create three distinct potential solutions which all had merit. We asked the panel to get together not just to consider their own preferences, but to take into account the strong feelings from the community, about which should we choose.

The final decision was unanimous, and strongly respected the views and comments of the community.

In the end the community, the committee and the panel all expressed a strong preference for Option 3, "A Bug's Eye View".
